TIPS FOR COPING

- Don't Talk, Listen: Staying abreast of what other pilots are experiencing helps you anticipate what ATC will want next.
- Use Correct Phraseology: Ditch the CB talk; it's amateurish and ATC gives pros the best service.
- Shorter Is Better: Keep your transmissions to a minimum, but be sure the necessary information is included.
- Plan Ahead: Get the ATIS early, monitor CTAF at your destination on the other radio and know which approach and/or runway to expect.
- **Don't Argue:** If you think you're getting poor service, you probably are, but save it for when you're on the ground and can use a telephone to resolve things.
- Go Sterile: During high-workload periods, isolate yourself from passenger conversation or ask them to be quiet.
- Be Prepared: If you haven't dealt with flying in busy airspace like Class B or C lately—or at all—get some training.
- Use The Magic Words: "Unable," "stand by" and "negative" are just as important as "please" and "thank you."
